The happiest of people don't necessarily have the best of everything; they just make the most of everything that comes along their way.


The brightest future will always be based on a forgotten past; you can't go forward in life until you let go of your past failures and heartaches.

The reason I'm willing to pay my local Chapter dues of \$2 a month to remain active within my chapter is because I believe in our union and what it does for our members.

I am able to share information and answer calls when a member has questions; whether, it's about our contract or a question about something that may be going on in their classroom. I believe as a **Chief Union Steward** it is my job to keep all members informed on things going on and also to train and help our Stewards when needed.

My job as a chief union steward is all about helping our stewards with training to help them with their duty as union stewards; ensure, members are up-to-date on what is going on within their contract and with their job. Plus, we meet with members over issues they have at their work sites.

I know this takes up a lot of my time, but because I believe in my job -- helping members in any way I can: meeting with them after their work hours when we need to, or, returning phone calls. This is an important part of being the Chief Steward and I want to make sure our members are protected at all times. I am also the person that does the New Employee Orientation (NEO) each month so that I can educate them about the union and what benefits they have when they first start working. We usually get all new members to sign up for the union; we do have some that don't join CSEA, but usually always get 50 percent or more during an NEO.

I will also do a drawing to encourage them to sign up. They are given a package of information from Human Resources and CSEA when they are hired and I go over the materials with them. I will then answer any questions the employees may have.

# GOVERNOR SIGNS CSEA-SPONSORED SCHOOL FUNDING BILL

CSEA-sponsored legislation Senate Bill 98 (Portantino), was signed into law by Governor Newsom on Sept. 22.

#### October 01, 2024

The bill highlights the significance of public school funding models based on enrollment rather than attendance and initiates much needed research on establishing a more equitable funding framework for our public schools.

"Our current attendance-based funding system is a disservice to students, especially those in underserved communities," said Association President Adam Weinberger. "Penalizing schools with higher absentee rates unfairly diverts resources away from those who need them most. Our members know firsthand the hidden costs of absenteeism—from tracking down missing students to preparing make-up assignments. We are thankful for Senator Portantino's leadership in authoring Senate Bill 98 and the Governor for signing it into law. This legislation will shed light on the inequities of our current system and provide lawmakers with the data necessary to create a more equitable and sustainable school funding model."

California is one of only six states that does not consider student enrollment figures for determining state aid to school districts. In California, school administrators plan budgets and expend funds based on the number of students enrolled, but receive state funds based on average daily attendance. When

student attendance drops below projected levels, districts are left in a deficit, having spent more funds than they receive from the state.

SB 98 directs the Legislative Analyst's Office to prepare and submit a report to the Legislature on the effects of changing the student count methodology of the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) from average daily attendance to student enrollment. The research would include the fiscal, programmatic, and administrative impacts of changing the student count methodology, and phase-in approaches to implement the cost of an enrollment-based funding model over several years.
